MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

Preparation is the Key to a Safe 2017 Hurricane Season

With the balmy summer months coming up on the calendar, it is time for Surfsiders to focus on their hurricane preparation. The South Florida ritual of preparing for potential storms is a part of life in the tropics. The real danger is being complacent. Last October we were brushed by Hurricane Matthew with little damage, but the event reminded us of the importance of preparation.

Now is the time for you and your loved ones to make your evacuation plans and check off your hurricane list. On page 6, there is important information on preparation and post-storm details. The two keys for weather safety are to prepare for the risks and to act on those preparations when alerted by emergency officials.

Surfside is a coastal Town with water to the east and west. Assess your risks and know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding and wind. Throughout the storm season (June 1 to November 30) monitor National Weather Service forecasts, particularly the posting of watches and warnings.

Surfside is in an evacuation zone. When a hurricane warning is posted (hurricane-force winds and conditions expected within 36 hours), residents must leave the Town and move to a safe, non-evacuation location. Do not wait until the last hour, because bridges may be closed for safety.

Take charge and keep yourself and your family safe and secure.

CODE COMPLIANCE CORNER



Sea Turtles and Lighting

Lights that shine on a nesting beach can draw turtle hatchlings away from the ocean and off the beach where they have a slim chance of survival. Beach lights also scare away female turtles crawling ashore to nest. Sea turtles still return to beaches that were once dark and empty to lay their eggs. Now they must compete with residents, tourists, obstacles and bright lights.

Beachfront lighting can also cause sea turtle hatchlings to become disoriented and wander away from the ocean towards the brightest lights. When this happens, the hatchlings often die from dehydration, exhaustion, predators and passing cars. Beachfront lighting can be properly managed to benefit humans and sea turtles. In general, the light should be aimed at the ground where it is needed for safety. The light should be shielded from the beach and outfitted with an amber or red LED bulb.

When lighting coastal property, remember these rules:

- 1. KEEP IT LOW Use low mounting height and low bulb wattage. Flood, spot and pole lighting are discouraged.
- 2. KEEP IT SHIELDED Use full cut-off fixtures that direct the light down to the ground. Shield fixtures so the bulb, lamp or glowing lens cannot be seen.
- 3. KEEP IT LONG Sea turtles are less disturbed by the long wavelengths of light (570 nanometers or longer), such as yellow, amber or red lights.

Traffic Stop Results in Seizing Stash of Loaded Guns

While making a traffic stop, Officer John Gentile approached a vehicle and smelled marijuana coming from the open window. Officer Gentile then saw a Glock pistol on the center console. As back up units arrived, the driver and passenger were ordered out of the vehicle, handcuffed and detained. Inside the car were five more guns, including an AK-47 assault rifle, shot gun, rifle and semi-automatic hand guns. Also found were loaded magazines and more than two hundred rounds of ammunition. The driver admitted to driving with the AK-47 on his lap and then trying to conceal it before the car came to a complete stop. Both subjects were arrested for weapons and a narcotics charge. Officer Gentile made seven arrests in April, including two other traffic stops in which marijuana and two additional firearms were seized. HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

With the Arrival of Hurricane Season, Surfsiders Should Begin Preparations Now

BEFORE THE STORM

Be Prepared: Purchasing supplies once a storm is threatening is expensive and strenuous. Shopping for items a little at a time before an event eliminates the stress and avoids long lines and empty shelves. Before the storm approaches, at minimum, make sure you have the items below:

- Food
- Water store enough water for drinking, bathing and cooking for all members of your family including pets
- First aid kit and any necessary medicines
- Storage protect important documents in zip-lock bags such as: birth certificates, passports, insurance documents, etc.
- Cleaning and supplies disposable eating utensils, mosquito repellent, gloves, liquid soap
- Tools flashlights, batteries, pliers, hammers, goggles, dust mask, gloves, screwdrivers, etc.
- Generator and appropriate fuel
- Battery operated radio and/or television
- Special items spare eye glasses, diapers, wipes
- Fill your vehicle's gas tank
- Money ATMs will likely be down during and after a storm, make sure you have cash on hand if needed
- Charge your cell phone and mobile devices

IMPORTANT DETAILS

Pets: In addition to food, make sure pets (cats/dogs) have identification tags and working pet carriers and leashes.

Shelters: Keep maps and numbers of your nearest shelter in case of emergency evacuations. (If you have pets call ahead to locate shelters that allow pets).

Photos: Take pictures of your property before and after the storm for insurance purposes.

LANDSCAPE

Properly pruning trees and shrubs before a storm can reduce the debris that may become airborne. Proper pruning also increases the likelihood that a tree can weather a storm. Consult or hire a certified and licensed arborist prior to tree pruning. Landscapers hired to maintain residential and commercial properties must remove vegetation including grass/tree clippings.

IMPORTANT: Do not begin any pruning or cleanup activities or place trash on the curb during a Hurricane Watch or Warning.

IF A STORM IS IMMINENT

Protect the areas of your home where wind can enter. Secure windows and doors, preferably with permanent County-approved storm shutters. A second option is to board up windows with precut, ready to install 5/8" plywood. Do not waste time taping windows. This **does not** prevent damage from wind and debris.

Bring in lawn furniture, garbage cans, bins and other items that are not secured and could become airborne. If you own a boat, use double lines at the marina. If it is trailered and cannot be garaged, stake it to the ground with rope and fill the hull with water.

Monitor the storm's progress regularly. Visit www. miamidade.gov or call 311 for updates on services. Depending on conditions, bus, rail, garbage and recycling services, as well as airport and seaport operations will be affected.

Surfside is in an evacuation zone. If an evacuation order is given, YOU MUST LEAVE and move to a safe location outside the evacuation zone. Do not wait. Bridges may close when the storm arrives. Take your local identification, for returning after the storm. Turn off your electricity at the main breaker and unplug appliances.

FLOODING

Surfside is a coastal community. Storm surge and flooding is possible during a hurricane. Surfside is currently operating on a storm drain pump system, which helps to clear flood waters quicker than expected. However, if electricity is lost, the system becomes less effective - with the water draining at a gravity flow rate.

EMERGENCIES

USE PHONES ONLY FOR EMERGENCIES. Call 911 only for **life-threatening** situations. After the danger of the storm is passed, call police or utility companies immediately to report hazards such as downed power lines, broken gas or water mains, overturned gas tanks, etc. Do not drive or walk through standing water.

FOLLOW THESE GUIDELINES WHEN ENCOUNTERING SEATURTLES

If you observe an adult sea turtle or hatchling sea turtle on the beach, follow these rules and guidelines:

- **DO NOT** report normal crawling or nesting (digging or laying eggs) to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWCC) unless the turtle is in a dangerous situation or has wandered off the beach.
- Stay away from crawling or nesting sea turtles. Although the urge to observe closely will be great, please resist. Nesting is a critical stage in the sea turtle's life cycle. Please leave them undisturbed.
- **DO REPORT** all stranded (dead or injured) turtles to the FWCC. **NEVER** handle hatchling sea turtles. If you observe hatchlings wandering away from the ocean or the beach, call: 1-888-404-FWCC or *FWC (Mobile Phone)




